OMN Letter January 2020

Dear Friends,

Yesterday, 4th January, the internet was awash with educated predictions as to just what the Prime Minister would say and what the new restrictions would be. It made for a very disconcerting afternoon, but it was inevitable. About 4:00pm thick, swirling storm clouds rolled overhead, the most beautiful and yet disturbing I have ever seen. They came almost on cue to cap a dreary day, a dreary day like so many others. But beyond these storm clouds the sky was still bright blue, the sun shining its fading rays above, oblivious to the gloom beneath.

Mr. Johnson said nothing new. We have been here before. But then we were at the beginning of spring with the promise of better days to come. Today we prepare to face the winter, our lives now well stuck indoors. I don't know about you, but I hate to be stuck indoors, to have my wings clipped and not be able to come and go as I please. To be unable to visit people face to face and share a cup of tea is rather unbearable for an extrovert. It's like being sent to your room as a child and someone forgot to call time and let you out! I am old enough and wise enough too to know that I'm not the easiest person to live with; the battle over loading the dishwasher continues apace. Lockdown in the Maldives might be a romantic idyll, but I have my doubts. We joke about a patio extension or new flower bed, but chances are the cat will bump us both off and live the high life off the life insurance! She's had enough of us being under paw 24/7 and wants her peace and quiet back. And who can blame her?

The truth is that lockdown then and now is hard for everyone, perhaps in different ways and for different reasons, but a challenge nonetheless. The stress and uncertainty plays on our minds, loneliness and fear impacts our mental health. Hardly anyone is unscathed in my experience. But I have been surprised at just how resilient people have been through it all. It may be the British stiff upper lip or the "keep calm and carry on" attitude that carries you. For others it may be a deep abiding faith in God that buoys the spirit through the storm. In any event we may still find that we need to talk to someone or ask for a bit of support. There is no weakness in that, it is a sign of strength to ask for help. The Ministry Team and I continue to offer that support so do contact us if you wish. That's what we're here for!

As bleak as the announcement felt yesterday, there was more than the hint of dawn on the near horizon. The vaccination programme will protect the most vulnerable and turn the tide on Covid. As more of us receive our jabs the virus will be painted into a corner and rendered far less a threat that it is at the moment. We just need to be patient and persevere, the light is coming and it is there for all to see. Every passing day brings us closer. All we have to do is continue to be careful and not take unnecessary risks in the meantime. It is with that in mind that St. John's closed for Christmas, a very difficult decision, but the wisest in view of the escalating infection rate across the Parish. We will proceed carefully and open when we are sure it is safe to do so. In the meantime we are exploring ways of keeping in touch and bringing people together virtually. People need to feel connected and to have space to share. Watch the weekly mailing for news of developments.

One way I have managed lockdown is to plan for the future. I haven't stuck to specific dates, but I have laid the ground work for a late summer holiday, a repeat visit home to see my

father, and have also started sharing my thoughts about how St. John's can recover and move forwards when it is safe to do so. Last month I presented a paper "Initiative 2022" to the PCC. A rather lackluster title and more a work in progress and discussion starter than anything else. It is a collection of ideas and opportunities to help us regain our momentum in the areas of worship, mission, and sustainability. I will be sending it out on the Mailing soon and ask that everyone have a read. Something may strike you as being of interest for you personally, or you may have fresh ideas to share. There is plenty of scope to get involved and make a difference. Nothing is written in stone and we are in this together. So do share your thoughts when the time comes.

This latest lockdown has extended our "fallow" time as we wait for liberation and plan for the future. This is a time to do those things we want and need to do, things to keep our minds occupied and lift our spirits. The same is true for our life together as St. John's! Let us use this time wisely and make the most of what it offers. Heaven knows come the summer we may be so busy making up for lost time that no one will care about the dishwasher!

A very straightforward read and a good story. Ms Chevalier captures English life in post WWI England and the difficulties faced by young women in a society still coming to terms with the new role of women in the home and the workplace.



Violet Speedwell has lost her fiancé and her brother in the war but is determined to make a new life for herself. Violet moves

to Winchester and one lunchtime, she goes into the cathedral and is enchanted by the work of the broderers and their fine needlepoint. She joins the group and learns how to embroider the cushions and kneelers in the cathedral. Beautifully written and researched, as always, this novel explores the friendships and relationships of a very likeable young woman. A gentle read which I am sure you will enjoy. Our average score was 8/10.



For January we have a choice: the fans of Robert Galbraith who are not daunted by a large tome, will be able to read 'Troubled Blood' – the alternative is 'Girl, Woman, Other', the joint Booker 2019 prize-winner by Bernadine Evaristo. So we shall have an interesting discussion in January!
