Vicar's Letter

Dear Friends, as I write this December is just around the corner and already Advent and Christmas loom large. The Church's year ends on Christ the King on the 26th November as we welcome eight children joining us at the Lord's Table as they make their first communion. This is a milestone for them in their own journey of faith, one that may become more important as they grow up and make their own ways in the world. That closeness and connection with Christ the Eucharist embodies, may be a source of strength and comfort as life unfolds and takes many twists and turns in the future. I know how important that is to many of us in our own spiritual experience. Alongside our adults and young people who were confirmed in October, St. John's is fulfilling its goal laid down in our Mission Action Plan to become an inclusive "Eucharistic community for all ages", something that underlines the importance of the sacrament and St. John's own style of worship, both traditional and forward-thinking. So please do join me in thanking God for his goodness as he gifts us with this unique responsibility and opportunity to share our faith afresh with all generations.

With even more people joining us at the altar for Communion, this Advent and Christmas promise to be even more special and meaningful this year. For some the seasonal round is old hat and all too often the spiritual dimension is drowned out by the wider message of buy, buy, buy as consumer pressure mounts, but the Team and I have planned the season with an eye to offer something for everyone. There will of course be our normal pattern of Sundays in Advent, but this year we kick things off with a bang. St. John's has been invited by the organisers of the Plough Green Christmas Tree committee to come and sing carols at the official lighting on the 2nd December between 4:00 and 6:30pm. We will be given a specific time slot closer to the date. On top of that, all proceeds from the evening will be given to our Angel Project, helping provide gift cards for children across the community so that every child can receive a present at Christmas. This is a fantastic development and I encourage everyone who can, to come and take part in this magical community event. The following day is Advent Sunday and, in addition to our 8:00 and 9:45am Sunday services, we will be holding an Advent Carol service at 6:30pm. Evensong no longer draws the congregation it once did, but we hope the Advent Carol service will strike that traditional chord that many enjoy. More carols follow on the 7th as Malden Parochial are holding their carol services at 9:00am and 6:00pm, with a special invitation for anyone at St. John's to come and celebrate with our schoolchildren. Our own Christmas Carol service will be on the 17th at 6:30pm followed by mulled wine and mince pies.

Thanks to popular demand Baby Jesus on Tour will begin from Advent Sunday as Baby Jesus visits schools and homes across the parish to spend the night. So many children, of all ages, enjoyed this last year and we've extended the time to cover the whole of Advent so everyone gets a chance to host him and reflect on the true meaning of Christmas. The list to host will be available in Church, just leave your name and a contact number so transport can be arranged. Hopefully he will appear in Church on Christmas Eve just in time for the Crib Service!

Messy Christmas Christingle will be on the 10th starting at 3:00pm. There will be a chance to make your own Christingle and decorations, with St. John's Christmas tree available to decorate by some of our other young people who may find the crafts a bit young for them. Both groups gather later for a few carols and then we will enjoy lovely Christmas refreshments in the Coffee Lounge.

For those who would like to look at the Christmas story afresh, there will be an informal study group using the popular Paula Gooder's book, Journey to the Manger, on Wednesdays after Communion at 11:45am in the Coffee Lounge beginning on the 22nd November. Coffee, tea, and refreshments will be available for this relaxed, social occasion. Anyone free who would like to explore the themes around the birth of Jesus are welcome to join us, no previous experience necessary As the 4th Sunday of Advent is Christmas Eve this year, there will not be an 8:00am service on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day. Last year we had two people for 8:00am and the previous year no one. Four services on Christmas Eve is just a bit too much when there are other opportunities to make your Christmas Communion either at Midnight Mass or Christmas Day at 9:45am when we are usually thin on the ground anyway. The Christmas Day event rolls on as usual in the Church Hall for all those on their own on Christmas Day. I will be popping in to thank all the volunteers on St. John's behalf and catch up with the merrymakers, but I'm sure there are still opportunities to help on this important occasion and places to join if you or someone you know will be alone on Christmas Day. The doggy bag alone is worth it, but there will be entertainment and the full works for Christmas Dinner to boot. Please speak to Pat Lovegrove if you would like to help or be a guest.

We will wrap up the Christmas season on Epiphany, which falls this year on the 7th January. As we commemorate the gifts of the Magi to the Christ Child, we will also be collecting money for our own Epiphany gifts to cover the increasing cost of candles, altar bread, wine and other items for our worship services. Do keep an eye on the Parish Mailing and Pew leaflet as these and other things will be advertised as we travel through Advent to celebrate the gift of Christ given at Christmas. December is usually a pressurised time of expectation and demands that can obscure the true meaning behind the glitz and wrapping paper. I encourage you to make a little time and space for yourself to engage with the gift we've all been given so that he can enrich your holiday anew this year.

Have you seen the Red Chair in the Lady Chapel?

The Red Chair Project was adapted in 2022 from a very successful campaign in French churches called *Une Place pour Elles*. The Project, from Restored, the Christian Network to End Domestic Abuse (CNEDA), has been adopted by the Mothers' Union during their annual 16 Days of Activism Against Gender Violence campaign.

The chair is to remind us that globally, every 11 minutes a woman or girl *dies* at the hands of a partner or family member. She should be here, sitting on this chair, or on one of the other many such chairs which are set up in churches and public places throughout the world, during the 16 Days of Activism against Gender Violence. The 16 Days focuses attention, but it should be remembered that sadly, domestic violence happens all the time, every day, and that 1 in 3 women are suffering, or have suffered, from such abuse. Domestic abuse is a pervasive issue affecting individuals and families of all backgrounds and causing lasting damage and trauma.

You are invited to light a candle in the Lady Chapel and pray for those women and girls who are abused or even die at the hands of a family member, and for ourselves as we respond.

RISE UP against such abuse

We pray ...

for your compassion as we seek to **Respond** – for your wisdom as we become better **Informed** for your gentleness as we try to **Support** – for your strength as we hope to **Empower** – and the mark of your Holy Spirit that **Unites** us together to work and **Pray** unceasingly, until situations change and freedom, life and love are restored to all. In your dear and powerful name we cry out to you together. AMEN.

My sponsored walk



My thanks to all those who kindly sponsored my walk in response to the "£10 Challenge", enabling me to raise £650 plus another £88 in Gift Aid – far more than I was expecting or even hoping!

I was fortunate in having a reasonable day for the walk – dry and neither too hot nor too cold. My plan was to begin by fortifying myself spiritually by attending the 11am Wednesday Eucharist. However, on arriving at St John's I discovered that it had had to

be cancelled as Fr Michael was doing duty at a funeral, so, slightly earlier than planned, I set off for Worcester Park Station, and using £3.68 of my initial £10, I bought a single ticket to Leatherhead, and arrived there at 11.37.

From there I walked through Leatherhead via North Street and Church Street, pausing at the medieval church of St Mary and Nicholas (now taken over by Holy Trinity Brompton and renamed prosaically as "Leatherhead Parish Church") arriving just before midday. I then headed north-east, crossing the A24 near the junction with the A243 and the M25 by the nearby footbridge.





At last in countryside, I walked up the bridleway south-east of Ashtead and about 12.30 joined the Thames Down Link footpath, which runs between Westhumble and Kingston. This led me through the outskirts of Ashtead. I made a slight detour to view another ancient church, St Giles, which I reached shortly after 1 p.m. In nearby Ashtead Park it was time for a sandwich!

Refreshed, I once more crossed the A24 and then the railway line near Ashtead Station (1.45) and then I was on more familiar ground, walking up the path on the boundary between Ashtead Common and Epsom Common, passing the Stew Pond to reach

the entrance to Horton Country Park around 2.15. The animals at Hobbledown Farm (right) gave me a good look as I passed.

With the end now seeming quite close I walked through the Castle Hill Nature Reserve, and emerged near the William Bourne pub at 3.15 – tempting, but with rain now threatening I



was anxious to get to the end. The path along the Bonesgate Stream and the Hogsmill River, by Tolworth Court meadows, took me up to Kingston Road, and I arrived back at St John's, rather hot and sweaty, just after 3.30.

It had been an enjoyable and interesting walk, doubly church funds in the process

satisfying in that I was boosting church funds in the process.

As well as the many family and friends who contributed to my "Collection Pot", I am most grateful to Alastair Harris for pointing me at this very easy way of raising money, and facilitating the transfer of the funds to St John's.

Poinsettia (Euphorbia pulcherrima)

pink, white, or marbled. The flowers are insignificant (please see the second photo) - they are the little green buds in the centre of the red bracts.

The colours of the bracts are The Poinsettia is the most popular flowering pot plant in the world. It is particularly well known for its red and green foliage and is widely seen at Christmas - please see the first picture below. It originates from Central and Northern America -Guatemala to Mexico - growing in "tropical dry forests". The Poinsettia was first described by Europeans in 1834.

The red attractive parts are bracts which are actually modified leaves; these are normally flaming red, with some cultivars being orange, pale green, cream, created through "photoperiodism" meaning that they require darkness (at least fourteen hours at a time for 6 to 8 weeks in a row) to become red, making it an ideal plant to grow in the short daylight days leading up to Christmas. The plants also benefit from abundant light during the day for the brightest colours. I think that the Poinsettia developed the photoperiodism so that they produce their flowers and subsequently seeds during the cooler months of the Central American winter, giving their seeds the best chance to germinate.

Poinsettias are in the family of plants known as Euphorbiacea and so is the rubber tree. Poinsettias, like rubber trees, produce latex sap, although the latex produced by Poinsettias is not suitable for the production of rubber.

I'm sure you'll see lots of Poinsettias in the shops this Christmas.

St John's Reading Group December 2023

At our November meeting, we discussed John Grisham's novel, The Partner. John Grisham is a prolific author and has a long list of novels to his name. When Patrick Lanigan 'dies' in a tragic car accident it has major repercussions. Just weeks after his 'death', 90 million dollars go missing from his former firm. Is there a connection? The shipbuilding magnate, Benny Aricia has devised a plan to defraud the US government but does not include Patrick in his plans. Patrick discovers the plan and decides to launch a daring plan of his own: to fake his death, take on a new identity and flee to South America. Four years go by – Patrick is in a new relationship with Eva and together they steal 90 million dollars from the firm's off-shore accounts. Aricia hires private investigators to track Patrick in a desperate bid to regain the stolen money. Patrick and Eva have a contingency plan to fall back on if Patrick is discovered and Eva takes full control of the money. When Patrick faces the FBI, a count of murder, his former wife and various law courts, his future is uncertain. He had a plan but.....

Read and discover what happens. With a twist at the end which leaves you wondering. An average score of 7/10.



For December we are reading another of Jane Harper's novels entitled **Exiles**. We have read several Jane Harper novels within the group – notably **The Dry.** This has been described as the third and final Aaron Falk mystery. A year previously, a young woman has disappeared at the local food and wine festival, leaving her young baby in a pram in the festival's car park. Whilst visiting friends, Aaron Falk becomes involved in the investigation. For our January meeting we shall be discussing Isabel Allende's The House of Spirits' which was her debut novel written in 1982. The novel details the life of the Trueba family across four generations and is set in the post-colonial and political upheavals of Chile. It was made into a film in 1983 and it starred Jeremy Irons and Meryl Streep. It has a large number of characters so we are set for a challenge.



If you are an avid reader of the Cormoran Strike novels, then the seventh in the series was published in September. Entitled 'The Running Grave', it is another hefty tome. Sir Colin Edensor, a retired civil servant, approaches Cormoran Strike and Robin Ellacott's detective agency seeking help to rescue his son Will from the Universal Humanitarian Church (UHC), which has been deemed a cult but claims to be a benevolent charity. With numerous characters and many twists and turns, it promises to be an interesting read – hopefully more accessible than the previous novel in the series.

The bookshops are heaving with so many tempting books so I hope that your Christmas List will contain some exciting new reads. Our next Reading Group (Christmas) meeting will be on Thursday 7th December at 8.00pm in the Church Coffee Lounge. This will be our 'bring and share' festive food evening!

Sales of these will continue for good, so we will feel the benefit of Challenge 2023 for a long time to come – a lasting gift.
